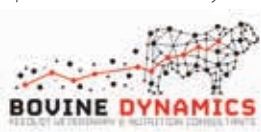

Temple Grandin

Colorado State University

Temple Grandin is a professor of animal science at Colorado State University, bestselling author, autistic activist, and consultant to the livestock industry on animal behavior. She has done extensive work on the design of handling facilities with an estimated half the cattle in the U.S. and Canada handled in equipment she has designed for meat plants. Other professional activities include developing animal welfare guidelines for the meat industry and consulting with McDonalds, Wendy's International, Burger King, and other companies on animal welfare. She also created the hug box, a device to calm autistic children. The subject of an award-winning biographical film, Temple Grandin, in 2010 she was listed in Time Magazine's 100 most influential people in the world.

Jude's current research and outreach work focuses on modeling the environmental impact of livestock production systems, specifically dairy and beef. Her principal professional goal is to communicate the importance of livestock industry sustainability and the factors affecting sustainability to enhance the knowledge and understanding of stakeholders within food production from the farmer through to the retailer, policy-maker and consumer.

Current research projects include comparisons of historical and modern production practices in dairy and beef industries; and the effect of technology use and management practices upon environmental impact. She has an active social media presence (tweeting as @bovidiva) and spends a considerable amount of time de-bunking some of the more commonly-heard myths relating to resource use and the environmental impact of livestock production.

LOGISTICS

On Arrival at Kerwee

Kerwee is located 1km south of Jondaryan (look for signage to The WoolShed). Upon arrival at Kerwee, delegates will be met whilst still in their vehicles and provided with a biosecurity form for completion and a unique electronic number for count in and count out. Delegates will be asked to park in a designated parking area and to move directly from there to the BeefWorks registration desk where they will submit their biosecurity form and receive their conference identity name badge. Delegates must wear their conference identification at all times whilst on site.

We ask all delegates to respect the biosecurity and workplace safety requirements of staging this event on a working site. For this reason we will ask delegates to comply with the following requirements:

- To register and pay by the deadline of October 16 (Please note that we are subject to number limits and can not accept registrations the week of the event or on-site);
- To complete and lodge a standard biosecurity form on arrival at Kerwee;
- To respect the electronic name tagging system which will provide an exact count in and count out of all delegates, exhibitors and event suppliers.

Event Format

Day 1 of BeefWorks will be conducted as a plenary style conference with all content delivered from the Kerwee workshop, which is being converted to a conference auditorium for the day. Delegates will not be permitted to venture beyond the workshop location during this day.

Day 2 of Beefworks starts at Feed Central's plant, (10775 Warrego Highway, Charlton, just on the outskirts of Toowoomba), with a breakfast seminar on alternative energies in the feedlot. Delegates will then move to Kerwee for the next session which commences at 9.30am. Delegates are asked not to be at Kerwee before 9am on Friday. The Kerwee session on Day 2 will be conducted primarily on the feedlot site. Delegates will spend the balance of the day in their dedicated group, rotating around three key points of interest on the feedlot including a facility inspection. Delegates are asked to remain in their designated group at all times. The Temple Grandin cattle handling demonstration will be contained within this aspect of the program. Every delegate will have the opportunity to view the Grandin demonstration.

Where to stay during BeefWorks

We recommend delegates choose from a range of accommodation in Toowoomba or Dalby, however camping facilities are available at the Jondaryan Woolshed complex for those seeking convenience and economic solutions. See www.jondaryanwoolshed.com.au. Any delegates seeking accommodation at Dalby should arrange this well before the event given competing interests.

The IAHP BeefWorks Dinner

The IAHP BeefWorks Dinner will take place at the Jondaryan Woolshed immediately following the conclusion of the ALFA AGM on October 23. Delegates are encouraged to come 'as they are' and as a consequence the dress code is casual.

Courtesy Buses

The conference programming is designed to encourage delegates to go directly from the end of Conference Day 1 and the ALFA AGM, to the evening dinner at the neighbouring Jondaryan Woolshed. ALFA is arranging for courtesy buses back to Toowoomba and Dalby at the conclusion of dinner, which will return to Kerwee (via Feed Central) the following morning. Delegates utilising the courtesy service will be able to collect cars from the Woolshed and return to Kerwee for the continuation of Day 2.

Buses will service all major motels in Toowoomba and Dalby. Schedules will be available by booking at the conference registration desk.

Station 1 - At the Thomson Longhorn cattle yards

Taking animal behaviour to the next paradigm: Working in a brand new set of Grandin-approved yards – we ask Temple to demonstrate the opportunities that exist to create further improvements.

E-Preg: A first-hand look at the new E-Preg technology with **Richard Shepard** of Heard Systems.

Predicting marbling in Wagyu cattle: Feedlot veterinarian **Dr Kev Sullivan** is trialling new technology that has the capacity to predict marbling in cattle destined for up to 500 days on feed. This is an opportunity to see the ultra sound in action.

Station 2 - Compost production, alternative energies and methane emissions



The Hart of composting: **Cam Hart** has stewardship of the Kerwee compost production. Cam gives an opening overview of the operation's approach to compost and a demonstration of the equipment.

Energy from manure – problems and possibilities: FSA has been working on the extraction of energy from both wet and dry manure for some time now. With CSIRO measurement technology on hand, complete with billy tea brought to the boil by dry cow pads to add further explanation, FSA Managing Director **Peter Watts** leads a fascinating discussion.

Ammonia losses and emissions from composts: **Matt Redding** from DPI Toowoomba provides some answers to the vexed question of 'does making compost result in an overall reduction in emissions?'. Matt's assessment compares compost to rapid application and stockpiling.

Feedlot bedding alternatives: MLA is currently funding a study to explore the positives and negatives of various bedding alternatives, particular from the context of animal health, welfare and the environment. Kerwee has signed up to the trial and has various woodchip combinations in a series of pens nearby. This discussion led by FSA will harness experiences from both Kerwee and other feedlots involved in the trial against the backdrop of the Kerwee woodchip base.

Station 3 - Located at the Commodities shed

BRD – the critical success factors: The results from the MLA commissioned QLD University BRD study involving 35,000 cattle on feed will be released at Beefworks. This vital piece of work covers the critical indicators that feedyards can now take on board with confidence. Project leader **Tim Mahony** reports.

Net Feed Efficiency research update: Angus Society CEO **Peter Parnell** presents the latest trial data on Angus cattle going through the Armidale Tullimba research facility and explains to us what the Angus society hopes to achieve by undertaking NFI measurement.

Opportunities to integrate with ProductionWise - This GrainGrowers' flagship online paddock management system was developed to provide crop management decision support for grain growers - but it has many unique decision support features that can extend to feedlots and graziers. The system includes auto-generated vendor declarations, quality management capabilities and high resolution climatic and satellite data. GrainGrowers' **Michael Pengilley** provides an outline of its feedlot industry application.

Feedyard Inspection: A walk down the lane with Kerwee feedlot manager **Brad Robinson** as he summarises the key features of the feedlot.

- Labour saving and/or
- Delivering improved accuracy/efficiency and/or safety in the day to day operation of the feedlot
- Materials for the creation of the Innovation should cost no more than \$3000

All finalists will receive a complimentary registration to BeefWorks and they (or a representative from the feedlot) will be asked to present a 3-5 minute powerpoint (or video clip) that demonstrates the effectiveness of the Innovation.

The winning Innovation will be selected by popular vote as judged by BeefWorks delegates and announced at 3pm on Thursday, October 24, at the culmination of BeefWorks Day 2. A cash prize of \$500 will be made available to the winner and \$250 to the runner up.
